On May 8, 2020 our staff was faced with a situation that no one ever expects to be faced with - an active shooter. As our grounds crew went about their normal everyday tasks of burials and grounds maintenance, they suddenly heard shots ring out. This is not an unusual occurrence here at the Veterans Cemetery as there are often Military Honors provided for the interment of veterans. But there was something unusual about these shots; they didn't sound the same. As one crew member, Steven Beck, looked toward the Administration and Chapel building, there were no Honors being performed. Then, as he scanned the area, he saw the active shooter as one of his victims fell to the ground. The shooter immediately turned his weapon toward the second victim and Steven saw the second victim shot. Steven then shouted out to the rest of the crew, 'Someone call the police!' By that time the entire crew was aware of the situation and Jennifer Gabriele, our grounds foreman, dialed 911 and the crew quickly made their way to the maintenance compound and locked themselves in. To their credit, every one of them acted according to the State's Active Shooter Training.

We also have a 'resident' volunteer, Chief Larry Keller, who was at the time rendering his time and labor in support of our staff in the mechanic shop and any miscellaneous work that needed to be done. Chief, as we call him, rushed to the scene to provide life-saving aid to the victims until the police arrived. He put himself selflessly in harm's way. He and another man, whose name or information is unknown, worked together. The anonymous gentleman was on the lookout for the shooter while Chief was rendering aid to the victims.

It is an honor for the Division of Veteran Services and the Department of State to recognize your alertness, observance and quick-acting response to the situation at hand.



Joshua Matticks is the new Executive Director of the Delaware Office of Veteran Services. His professional background is centered entirely around the United States military, our nations service member's and veterans. Joshua is a Retired Air Force wounded warrior whose honorable service spanned 10 years. His service comprised of heavy aircraft maintenance and Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Dover AFB Honor Guard. Josh spent two years with Team Air Force as a wounded warrior athlete where he received two Bronze Medals during the 2016 Warrior Games, a nationwide competition between the branches of U.S. Military, Australia, and Britain. He volunteers with the Recovering Airman Mentorship Program through the Air Force guiding wounded warrior's through the harsh terrain of transitioning from active service to civilian status.

Josh began working with the Office of Veteran Services as an Administrative Specialist in 2016 where his passion for helping veterans grew enormously. Josh became a Veteran Service Officer in 2017 and began a working relationship with Dover AFB to better assist Active Duty, National Guard and Reserve service member's by creating classes to better understand the VA and its seemingly endless possibilities. Josh's passion for helping veterans is his motivation, built around the core values of the United States Air Force: Integrity first, Service before self, and Excellence in all we do.

With nearly 10 years of active-duty service in the Army, Dennis Linehan was a crypto linguist with the 10th Special Forces Group (Airborne). His service included multiple deployments to West Africa and Afghanistan, and combat missions alongside allied and local indigenous forces.

As a recent Wilmington University graduate with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice; I plan to pursue a master's degree in social work to continue working with fellow veterans.

Dennis started with the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs in November of 2019 and now works with veterans as the newly appointed Kent County Veteran Service Officer. Periodically, he'll be called away from commission duties to mentor other veterans at Melwood Veterans Services through Operation Tohidu in Upper Marlboro, Md. (https://melwood.org/veterans-services/operation-tohidu/: A holistic retreat helping wounded warriors overcome obstacles to their recover and supporting their successful reintegration.) Dennis enjoys family outings as well as getting out on his motorcycle. With an enthusiastic outlook on learning about other cultures and picking up languages, traveling is a passion.

Elvira L. Jameson grew up in Chicago, IL being the youngest of five. She entered the Air Force in 1986 and transitioned to the AF Reserves in 2001. During her time in the reserves, she was assigned to the 514th FSS, McGuire AFB, NJ where she became the NCOIC Lodging services and training manager. In 2003 she became an Individual Mobilization Augmentee assigned to the 436th Services Squadron. She's currently assigned to the 512th Memorial Affairs Squadron as Superintendent of Lodging. She has several wing and unit duties from Unit CPR Instructor to being part of the Wing Inspection Team (WIT) representative. Elvira was deployed to Bahrain, in the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Shield and has supported Operation Desert Storm, Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom as NCOIC, Lodging Services. During her military career she has earned the top two highest awards a Services member can earn, the Innkeeper Award (2011) and the Hennessey Award (2017).

In her civilian sector she has worked as a Custodial Housekeeping Supervisor, Eagles Rest Inn and Golf Course Snack Bar Manager at Dover AFB. Elvira has earned her Associates Degree in Fitness, Recreation and Services Management through the Community College of the Air Force and a Bachelor's Degree in Hotel Management from American Public University System.

Elvira joined OVS right before COVID hit as our part-time Veteran Service Officer. She's been great in helping manage our current overwhelming case load of service connected claims and other benefits for veterans and their family members. She enjoys cooking, gardening, and wine tasting in her spare time.



A Taste of Delaware History for Christmas and a Cause

For more than a half century master photographer Gary Emeigh has travelled the state and flown over it as a pilot and at one time as a crop duster.

In 2019 he published a coffee table book - 432-pages of color and black-and-white images representing more than 50 years of events and the Delawareans who made them notable for the Delaware State News and The News Journal.

"The Ink in My Blood," 432 pages of people, places and things the average person rarely encounters, including leaders, celebrities, heroes, villains, extreme weather, sports, entertainment, police and crime stories, miracle rescues, and the average person doing meaningful and remarkable things.

And having been raised in a military family he's never forgotten his roots with those who serve and their families. He still flies out of Dover AFB as a Civil Air Patrol pilot on search and rescue missions. That led him to offer proceeds from some of the final copies of his book to the Delaware Veterans Trust Fund. The trust fund, signed into law in September 2013, operates under the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs.

It provides emergency financial assistance to honorably discharged military veterans residing in Delaware. It has stopped utilities disconnections, respossessions of vehicles, made emergency repairs on homes, and sometimes put food on the table. All payments are made directly to creditors. "This book about our state and its history would make a wonderful Christmas gift while benefitting those who serve," said Dave Skocik, president of the Friends of Delaware Veterans. He was joined by Paul Davis, VP of the Friends and president of the Delaware Council, Vietnam Veterans of America.

Valued by the publisher at \$80, the book will be provided at no cost to anyone who contributes at least \$35 to the Veteans Trust Fund until they're gone. They can be purchased at Forney's Too on Loockerman Street in Dover or at the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs, 802 Silver Lake Blvd., in the Silver Lake Office complex off Walker Road with checks made to Veterans Trust Fund. The office is marked by the American, Delaware, and POW/MIA flags.

Wilmington VA Medical Center to begin COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution with Moderna at its Outpatient Clinics in Delaware and southern New Jersey

Wilmington Veterans Affairs Medical Center is scheduled to expand COVID-19 vaccinations with the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine at its Community Based Outpatient Clinics in Kent and Sussex counties in Delaware and Atlantic, Cape May and Cumberland counties in New Jersey beginning Dec. 30.

Wilmington VA Medical Center rolled out its COVID-19 vaccination program Dec. 22 at the main medical center in Wilmington following the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Emergency Use Authorization for this vaccine. Initial doses of the vaccine were offered to health care personnel and Veterans in the community living center.

"As vaccine supplies increase, our ultimate goal is to offer COVID-19 vaccination to all Veterans and employees who want to be vaccinated," said Vince Kane, Director of Wilmington VA Medical Center. "Initially, we will be focusing on vaccinating Veterans with higher risk factors such as age and preexisting health conditions." As vaccines become available for more groups of Veterans, VA care teams will reach out to eligible Veterans to schedule vaccinations. **There is no need to preregister or come to a facility to sign up.**

Even after receiving COVID-19 vaccination, employees and Veterans should continue:

- Wearing face coverings
 - Washing hands often
- Watching physical distancing

Vaccine Background

Wilmington VA Medical Center is one of 113 VA Medical Centers across the country to receive the first limited supply of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. Sites were identified based on need for the vaccine according to CDC's 1A prioritization and capacity to store the vaccine at -20°C.

The Moderna COVID-19 vaccine was 94 percent effective in clinical trials in preventing COVID-19 disease. The vaccine is administered in two doses, 28 days apart. The side effects appear similar to those of other vaccines and are short-lived.

The Wilmington VA Medical Center and our five CBOCs in Delaware and southern New Jersey are open, safe and are ready to care for your medical needs. Our Emergency Department remains open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and fully ready to meet your emergent health care needs. Please schedule all your appointments including blood work prior to coming to the facility.

Take comfort in knowing our hospital and CBOCs are safe. Doctors, nurses, our entire health care team have taken every precaution to ensure that Veterans are protected from infection when they come to the hospital, our CBOCs and emergency room. All locations are screening, require masking and employing physical distancing.

Kent County Community Based Outpatient Clinic Set to Open Beginning of 2021 (Pending Official Date)

The new facility in the former Blue Hen Mall at 655 S. Bay Road in Dover is scheduled to open in the beginning of 2021 will increase the clinic space from its current size of 9,000 square feet to over **29,000 square feet**.

"In VA it is our mission to put Veterans first in everything we do and provide them with exceptional health. It is our privilege to meet the health care needs and challenges Veterans face. This clinic will be an example of that commitment. said Vince Kane, Director, Wilmington VA Medical Center"

The additional space will allow for the expansion of services such as: primary care, behavioral health, specialty services and telehealth.

American Legion Post 17 in Lewes was not going to let the COVID-19 pandemic keep them from celebrating Veterans Day Nov. 11. Planned as an outdoor event at the post's new flag garden, rain caused the event to move under roof in the post's pavilion.

Taking part in the ceremony were Murt Foos, president of Auxiliary Unit 17, as emcee; Kellie Bergen, Unit 17 chaplain; Ed Bergen, Post 17 commander; Doug Spelman, Squadron 17 commander; Mike Mulligan, first vice commander; Rich Mansfield, Marine Corps League; John Hammond, Post 17 chaplain; and JGar Helling, featured singer.

Special tribute was given to Lewes Mayor Ted Becker and Beebe Healthcare CEO and President David Tam as warriors and leaders in the community's battle against COVID-19. Becker served on city council for 10 years before being elected mayor in 2014. Tam moved from California to start his new job March 17, the same time Delaware officials instituted a state of emergency because of the pandemic.

Becker, a U.S. Army and Army Reserves veteran, served from 1978-1996 as an occupational therapist with most of his duty at Walter Reed National Military Hospital in Washington, D.C., working with wounded members of the military. "I want to commend the American Legion for the important role you play to help men and women get back to a normal life," he said.

Becker has a strong family military background with his grandfather serving in World War I in Germany and his father serving as a Merchant Marine.

Tam, who retired as a captain from the U.S. Navy 13 years ago, served for 24 years in the medical side of service, doing his pediatric residency at U.S. Naval Hospital in Oakland, Calif. Tam also has a strong family military background with his daughter serving as a first lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and his wife's father serving in Vietnam and Korea.

Veteran Reaches Out to Civilians



A Dover businessman wanted the entire month of November to be about veterans. Navy veteran Doug DeAngelis and his wife Kathy of Patriot Auto and Truck Care at 497 S. DuPont Hwy, Dover, have come up with an idea to remind people that veterans benefit people throughout the year, not only on a single day in November.

"While veterans are honored on Nov. 11, we are going to give everyone who knows a veteran a 10 percent discount on all of our services throughout November," said Mr. DeAngelis. The idea came from a local convenience store that's discounting coffee during October and he thought why not reach out in the name of his fellow veterans.

"Bottom line, anyone who has a veteran in their family, knows a veteran, or will even say "God Bless our veterans," will be provided a discount during the entire month of November. Generations of Generosity

Dover resident William "Bill" Willis has never forgotten his fellow airmen of the 8th Army Air Corps and the heavy price they paid during WWII.

Nor will he forget bailing out of his B-24 Liberator over Holland. Although injured and in the shoot down and held captive by the German army, he was more fortunate than several of his fellow crewmembers who didn't survive.

The Eighth Air Force was established as VIII Bomber Command in Langley Field, Virginia in January 1942. Later that spring an advanced detachment was established near RAF Bomber Command Headquarters at RAF Daws Hill, England. They were often referred to as "The Mighty Eighth," specializing in heavy, strategic bombing.

But in a way of paying it forward to his fellow veterans of succeeding generations, the 95-year-old and his wife Betty presented a \$10,000 check to the Friends of Delaware Veterans on December 21, 2020.

The Friends is the official fundraising organization of the Delaware Veterans Trust Fund, under the auspices of the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs. The Trust Fund provides emergency financial assistance to veterans residing in Delaware.

It has prevented shutoff of utilities, stopped repossessions of vehicles and made emergency repairs on homes in onetime grants paid directly to creditors. The Friends board is comprised of military veterans who serve pro bono.

"Mr. Willis was honored by the Delaware legislature in June 2019 on the 75th anniversary of D-Day. I can't think of any more selfless gift to help veterans than this," said Dave Skocik, Friends president.
